IMPORTANT RULES:



- Abstracts must not exceed 350 words (specific word limits apply to each section).
- References are not included in the word count.
- Include three learning objectives this is mandatory! Abstracts without these objectives will be automatically rejected.
- Ensure Institutional Review Board (IRB) approval is completed, if applicable.
- All co-authors must agree to the submission.
- Podium Presentations:
- Limited to three presenters per presentation.
- Don't miss the chance to share your knowledge and make an impact on transplant nursing practice!

RESEARCH/QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

This type of abstract is ideal for presenting original scientific studies or quality improvement projects.

Recommended Structure:

- Introduction and Objective (50-75 words):
- Explain the problem investigated or the project's objective. Include the rationale for your
- research or improvement initiative.

Example: "This study explores the impact of standardized nursing protocols on reducing post-transplant infections."

Methods (100-125 words):

Describe the study design (quantitative, qualitative, mixed methods, etc.), participants, setting, instruments, data collection, and analysis.

Example: "A cohort study was conducted with 50 liver transplant patients in a high-complexity hospital unit."

- Results (100-125 words):
- Present the most relevant findings. Use numbers or statistics to highlight impacts or trends.
 - Example: "The protocol implementation reduced infection rates by 30% (p < 0.05)."
- Conclusion (50-75 words):
 - Explain the practical relevance of the results.

Example: "The adoption of standardized protocols is essential to improve health outcomes for transplant patients."



2 LITERATURE REVIEW

This abstract type is suited for compiling and analyzing studies on a specific topic.

Recommended Structure:

Introduction and Objective (50-75 words):

Present the topic and justify its relevance.

Example: "This study synthesizes evidence on self-care strategies in liver transplant recipients."

Methods (75-100 words):

Describe how the review was conducted: databases, inclusion/exclusion criteria, and

search strategy.

Example: "A review of 50 articles published between 2015 and 2022 was conducted using PubMed, Scopus, and CINAHL databases."

Results (100-125 words):

Summarize the main findings, identifying patterns or gaps in the literature.

Example: "Studies highlight the importance of continued education to improve treatment adherence, but few address cultural barriers."

Conclusion (50-75 words):

Indicate how the findings can influence future practices or research.

Example: "There is a need for studies on tailored educational strategies for diverse populations."



3 CASE STUDY/CASE REPORT

This category highlights unique clinical experiences or significant outcomes.

Recommended Structure:

- Introduction (50-75 words):
- Provide the case context and explain its significance.
 - Example: "We report the case of a kidney transplant patient after 15 years on hemodialysis, with an unexpectedly favorable outcome."
- Case Description (125-150 words):

 Detail the clinical history, interventions performed, and case progression.

Example: "The 45-year-old patient experienced acute rejection controlled with immunosuppressant adjustments. Full recovery was observed after six months."

- Discussion (100-125 words):
- Analyze the case's relevance in comparison to existing literature.
 - Example: "This case illustrates the effectiveness of individualized immunological monitoring, aligning with recent international guidelines."
- Conclusion (50-75 words):
- Highlight key learnings and potential clinical implications.

Example: "This case emphasizes the importance of personalized approaches for high-complexity patients."



GENERAL TIPS FOR ALL ABSTRACTS:

• Learning Objectives: Include three clear objectives outlining what the audience will learn.

Example: "After this presentation, participants will be able to:

- 1. Identify strategies to improve self-care in transplant recipients.
- 2. Understand the impact of personalized interventions on post-transplant outcomes.
- 3. Apply evidence-based protocols in transplant care."
- Clarity and Conciseness: Use straightforward sentences and avoid jargon.
- Review: Proofread and revise the abstract to ensure compliance with the guidelines.
